Forgive Us for the Loss of Each Child Born

My husband brought home two fliers from Catholic Peace Fellowship (CPF) -Philadelphia February 2024 Meeting. One was about a Catholic Environment event, but it was the second flier that caught my attention. I connected strongly with what I read "A Silent Procession for Peace- A Public Ritual; We grieve the Loss of Every Child – There is Another Way".

Yes – at last an event that resonated with me, an event that reached behind the physical to connect with the soul. I detest war and violence. I seldom appreciate the politics. I am very basic about this - "War is one woman's child killing another woman's child". The Procession was scheduled for Sunday, February 25, 2024, at 2:00 p.m. and sponsored by the American Friends of "Combatants for Peace". Combatants for Peace is a grassroots movement of former Palestinian and Israeli fighters dedicated to achieving peace through non-violent activities. We were to meet at Chestnut Hill, Peace Park on the Corner of Germantown Avenue, and Mermaid Land and process for a one-mile round trip walk.

"A Silent Procession for Peace- A Public Ritual." A Ritual spoke to me of meaning and a Public Ritual – spoke of the willingness to bear witness to this shared meaning – "to our commitment to preserving the life of every child, transcending political divisions to engage in nonviolent solutions."

There were several of us from CPF in attendance. The event started with chanted prayer led by Rabbi Nancy Fuchs Kreimer and Rabbi Malkah Binah Klein. Soft repetitive rhythmic song accompanied by a tambourine-sized drum. We were told to pick up the replicas of shrouded dead babies and the posters of Israeli and Palestinian children that were killed in the recent conflict. We were asked to walk in silence.

As I bent to pick up a poster, I saw the face that I recognized – it was the face that had galvanized me into action weeks earlier. It was the face of a 12-year-old that I read about in the

BBC New Jerusalem news. It was a story about Awni Eldous, a young Palestinian boy who wished to be an influencer on You Tube and had been one of the first killed in the war. The story stated that his aim was to find fame by reaching 1,000,000 subscribers. He had only reached one thousand at the time of his death. Since his death, he has surpassed 1,500,000 followers and counting. I saw the photo of all his brother and sisters – lovely smiling children who were also killed.

Hearing of this I was engulfed by emotions. I was lying down comfortably in my warm bed and children were dying in so many places. When did I become so apathetic? In that instant I reached for my computer and sent letters to the political representatives appealing for a cease fire intervention. I found my credit card to add to my "Doctors without Borders" subscription. I thought of the many families and children that would not see the New Year 2024. Where was my gratitude for my blessings? In about five hours, our family, about 17 adults and children in total, would be coming to our home to celebrate "The Feast of the Seven Fishes". I had a sudden change of perspective, moving from complaining about the hosting duties as a burden to gusto and thankfulness for this opportunity to celebrate with our family. All the stress associated with making sure everything was perfect disappeared, I had one goal – to celebrate with our family on behalf of families everywhere who no longer were able to share a meal. I felt this cloud of gratitude as I entertained, and I was even thankful for the post clean up.

I did not pick up the poster of Awni Eldous at the event, someone else had picked it up. I walked in the procession with tears running down my face as the memories engulfed me. When we completed the procession, we were requested to place the posters down and handed a white carnation. Someone nudged me to place the carnation on the posters. I did not wish to do this, but I complied. I wished to carry it home and place it in a vase and let it dry as the dry palms from Palm Sunday that I kept Infront of my house altar.

It is now the season of Lent. I think of the reading from Matthew 27:24. The translation from Aramaic reads "Pilate took water and washed his hands in front of the crowd. 'I am free from the blood of this righteous man.' Am I doing enough? Am I asking this question because, like Pilate. I do not wish to be held accountable for the loss of all these children's lives?

My Catholic Cursillo formation recommends the tripod of Piety, Study, and Action:

Piety:" Should I be standing in the gap with my prayers for those such as Combatants for Peace?

Study: Should I be reading and become aware of places everywhere including my adopted city of Philadelphia and my country of Trinidad where children are lost daily?

Action: Should I be engaging in public rituals of peace? Should I be increasing support for organizations that engage in peaceful solutions? Should I be appealing to our elected officials?

A verse from Sweet Honey in the Rock song "We Are" declares – "For each child that born, a morning star rises and sings to the universe who we are."

My addition to this song would be - For each child that dies, a night star falls and cries to the universe ... what we have done.

"War is a Defeat"

~ Pope Francis

In response to every war in recent years, Pope Francis has repeated "war is a defeat." For the tragic loss of life in Syria, DRC, Sudan, Myanmar, Ukraine, Haiti and now Gaza (and Israel / Palestine in general) to name a few, he repeats "every war is a defeat" and the only winners of war are those who make and sell the weapons. This is both prophetic and obvious to anyone who considers the profits of weapons manufacturers. The Pope refers to profiteers in the arms industries when he refers to those who 'make' the weapons and not factory workers.

A friend of CPF, who is a specialist in the financial industry, sadly pointed out "that bombs blow up and *must* be replaced, offering endless revenue opportunity as long as it's a war-torn world." War investors can insidiously give money to political parties and even terrorist groups to guarantee these endless wars. In Darfur, the Sudan in general and South Sudan, regional and global powers have their proxy wars at the expense of the lives of hundreds of thousands of civilians.

Francis goes on to lament the proliferation of weapons, which leads to their eventual use. For us in and around Philadelphia, as well as those in other cities, this also means guns on our streets and sadly in the hands of teenagers. The Pope speaks also to other hard issues like forced migration, poverty and the climate and environmental crisis and connects them all to the pervasive culture of the modern world driven by economics; fueled by greed and selfishness.

Pope Francis always speaks to Hope when he addresses these grave issues. This contemplation is a challenge, but his Holiness reminds us that Hope is not something we 'feel', Hope is something we 'do'.

We Grieve the Loss of Every Child - A Silent Procession for Peace

paraphrase text from original flier by Jean Warrington of Chestnut Hill

"A Silent Procession for Peace: We Grieve the Loss of Every Child" took place on Sunday, Feb. 25, at 2 p.m. The event was organized by the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Friends of Combatants for Peace (CfP), a grassroots movement founded in 2006 that brings together Palestinians and Israelis committed to achieving sustainable peace through joint nonviolence.

The procession mourned and commemorated the young lives lost in the ongoing conflict, advocating for peace, equality, and freedom in their homeland. Organizers emphasize the use of civil resistance, education, and other forms of nonviolent activism to challenge systems of oppression and envision a peaceful future.

Participants carried signs and shrouded bundles to signify the bodies of babies killed provided by the organizers, featuring messages such as "We grieve the loss of every child," and "Shalom, Salaam, Let there be Peace," along with visual representations of Palestinian and Israeli children who have fallen victim to the conflict.

Attendees were asked to adhere to a dress code of dark colors and refrain from bringing flags, banners, or message T-shirts. The event featured drums but no chants or songs. Phyllis Anne Grady 1929-2023

Phyllis Anne Grady passed away peacefully in her sleep on June 26, 2023, at the age of 93. She was the beloved daughter of the late John J. and Lulu M. Grady. She is survived by her loving sister, Mary Lou Grady.

Born in 1929, Phyllis grew up in Havertown and was a graduate of Sacred Heart Academy. She earned a bachelor's degree in English from Manhattanville College of the Sacred Heart in New York City. Following graduation, she was an elementary school teacher in New Jersey and Pennsylvania while at the same time earning two graduate degrees. She received her second master's degree in library science from Drexel University.

It was in the elementary school library where she found her greatest joy, combining her love for books with her talent for working with children. She served as an elementary school librarian in the Radnor School District for many years—at Rosemont School until its closing in 1980 and then at Wayne Elementary School. Her library was a welcoming place for students, teachers, and parent volunteers. She greeted each child by name and guided them in choosing high quality children's literature that captured their interest. Decades later, former students remember fondly the interest she showed in them as individuals. She was known for broadening her students' experiences by bringing noted children's authors and illustrators to talk to her students and share their love of writing and illustration.

An avid reader throughout her life, Phyllis kept abreast of current events. Over the years, she was involved in efforts to help those less fortunate. She donated countless hours to the mission of Amnesty International, supported prison inmates through correspondence, and dedicated her efforts to providing food for the homeless.

Relatives and friends are invited to attend her Visitation on Saturday morning, July 15, 2023, 9:00-9:50 AM in St. Malachy Church 1429 N 11th St. Philadelphia, PA 19122 followed by her Mass of Christian Burial 10:00 AM. Interment will be held privately at a later date.

Summary of Spring 2023 Catholic Peace Fellowship Synodality Retreat and Discernment for the future of CPF Phila

CPF commends John McGinty for his careful preparation of CPF Phila Synodality Gathering before returning to Wisconsin last summer. Below is John's full report and commentary, "CPF Philadelphia Synodality and Discernment Process, Amidst a Troubled World." CPFNL would like to share with our readers the following summary.

As a group CPF had to prioritize the urgent need to oppose all war and the terrible reality of the proliferation of weapons from nuclear warheads to handguns and everything in between; Nuke elimination to Gun Control. CPF members understand the looming climate and environmental crisis as a grave threat to organized human life. However, as a peace group, we acknowledge these environmental catastrophes will also precipitate more wars and violence. We also recognized racism and inter-group hatred are the fuel for violence and war; opposing these forces is a mission of peace. Finally, we wish to continue to support the effort for the canonization of both Franz and Franziska Jagerstatter, in conjunction with the care for the statue of Franz at St. Malachy. We pray to allow the spirit to guide and move us to continue to witness through actions for peace.

As a group we needed to focus our energy on these missions along with maintaining the CPFphila.com website. As such the effort to publish a multi-article newsletter on a regular basis did not materialize as a priority. This issue will be the last CPF newsletter in this format. Catholic Peace Fellowship Phila. Synodality and Discernment Process, Amidst a Troubled World

I heard a thousand blended notes, While in a grove I sate reclined, In that sweet mood when pleasant thoughts Bring sad thoughts to the mind.

To her fair works did Nature link
The human soul that through me ran;
And much it grieved my heart to think
What man has made of man.

Through primrose tufts, in that green bower, The periwinkle trailed its wreaths; And 'tis my faith that every flower Enjoys the air it breathes. The birds around me hopped and played, Their thoughts I cannot measure:— But the least motion which they made It seemed a thrill of pleasure.

The budding twigs spread out their fan, To catch the breezy air; And I must think, do all I can, That there was pleasure there.

If this belief from heaven be sent, If such be Nature's holy plan, Have I not reason to lament What man has made of man?

The preceding poem written by William Wordsworth, titled: "Lines Written in Early Spring," embodies the synodality and discernment process undertaken by Catholic Peace Fellowship during spring and summer 2023... amidst the troubling Russia-Ukraine war. In April 2023, thirteen months after Russia's most recent invasion of Ukraine, CPF Philadelphia engaged in

retreat on Pope Francis's invitation for synodality, facilitated by Fr. George Bur, Angle and Phil Berryman. The April retreat inspired a summer-long process, in which CPF members engaged in a spiritual conversation of communal apostolic discernment as used by Jesuit and Ignatian communities. An interesting parallel has emerged between CPF's synodality and discernment process, and Wordsworth's poem about spring. Just as Wordsworth's narrator recognizes reality to be harsh, "And much it grieved my heart to think/ What man has made of man;" CPF recognizes reality's harshness, and throughout the summer-long process expressed moral outrage over the suffering of Ukrainians amidst an avalanche of violence that, like so often in our human history, rages without justification, and rages without discrimination, and rages without conscience. Yet, despite violence's rage, Wordsworth invites us to listen for Nature's hope, "Through primrose tufts, in that green bower,/ The periwinkle trailed its wreaths;/ And 'tis my faith that every flower/ Enjoys the air it breathes." Similarly, despite "What man has made of man," members of Catholic Peace Fellowship actively listened for the Holy Spirit's hope, as shared in the thoughts of one another. The culmination of the summer-long synodality and discernment process was the organic emergence of four guiding themes representing CPF's strength and vision moving forward, as a testament of non-violent resistance to "What man has made of man."

The CPF synodality and discernment process unfolded in three phases throughout spring and summer 2023. The goal of the first phase was to celebrate who we were historically as CPF, by sharing meaningful pictures, objects, and memorabilia, that celebrate our past. The echoes from our past mirrored Wordsworth's poetic lines, "The budding twigs spread out their fan,/ To catch the breezy air;/ And I must think, do all I can,/ That there was pleasure there." Fundamentally, our strength as CPF comes from the people who have made up our organization in the past. During the who we were phase, we engaged in thinking deeply about our past spiritual experiences as part of CPF. Remembering CPF instances, and CPF events, that helped us feel fulfilled and uplifted. Remembering CPF people who have helped us feel inspired and spiritually grounded. Remembering with pride and gratitude how we have experienced CPF attempting to make the world a better place.

The goal of the second phase was to celebrate who we are as CPF, by sharing meaningful reflections on several introspective questions. The voice of our current CPF members emulated Wordsworth's poetic lines, "The birds around me hopped and played,/ Their thoughts I cannot measure:—/ But the least motion which they made/ It seemed a thrill of pleasure." Fundamentally, our strength as CPF comes from the people who make up our organization. We thought deeply about our current spiritual experiences as part of CPF, and thought deeply about what draws us to CPF, and what inspires us to be part of CPF. We shared written reflections on three distinct aspects of what CPF means to us as current members, that is the Catholic aspect, the Peace aspect, and the Fellowship aspect.

The goal of the third phase was to welcome others' ideas, and support others' ideas, about who we want to be as CPF in the future, by trying to make meaningful connections between the ideas shared, and our own understanding of CPF. The ideas about our future resembled Wordsworth's poetic lines, "If this belief from heaven be sent,/ If such be Nature's holy plan,/ Have I not reason to lament/ What man has made of man?" Amidst our troubled world, amidst Russia's immoral terror, amidst Ukraine's unconscionable suffering, the moral strength of CPF steadfastly emanates among the people who currently make up our organization. We thought deeply about where CPF should go in the future, thought deeply about our hope for CPF in the future, and thought deeply about what would be inspiring for CPF

to address in the future. We shared many ideas, welcomed others' ideas, supported others' ideas, all about who we want to be as CPF addressing the future... amidst our troubled world.

Triumphantly emerging from the synodality and discernment process were the four themes of: A voice against war; Inclusive prayerful bridge-building through actions that reflect a realistic selfevaluation of our available time and talent; Promoting peace with the Earth; Fellowshipping with each other. The first theme, a voice against war, renews CPF Philadelphia's foundational testimony to a voice for alternative non-violent activity. This foundational idea directs CPF to build consensus around organizing and creating public vigils for peace endeavors, standing in the marketplace to say No to war and the preparations for war. There were two prominent examples of this theme over the last year. On January 28th, 2023, CPF co-sponsored with the Institute for Forgiveness and Reconciliation, an event at Chestnut Hill College featuring the showing of the film, "The Nuns, The Priests and the Bombs." On May 14th, 2023, CPF members Bill Hartman, Barbara Sheehan, and Sister Maryanne Zakreski, met other activists from Women's Strike for Peace, Brandywine Peace Community, and Veterans for Peace, at Penn's Landing and spent the afternoon in solidarity with the crew of "The Golden Rule." This Peace Maker sailing ship was first launched by a Quaker crew in 1958 with the intent of navigating a seaward protest to nuclear test sites on islands in the Pacific. Along that initial voyage the ship was stopped, and the crew arrested for violation of US law.

The second theme, inclusive prayerful bridge-building through actions that reflect a realistic selfevaluation of our available time and talent, reflects CPF Philadelphia's recognition that changes in our membership over time, encourage small and big acts of reasonable capacity. Such acts are centered in prayer, are opportunities to extend open invitations to all, and are occasions to participate with other peacemakers in sensible ways.

The third theme, promoting peace with the earth, extends CPF Philadelphia's commitment of non-violence to include all creation. Extending non-violence to all creation is based on Pope Francis's Laudato Si', in which he bonds our Catholic concern for the human environment, with a needed concern for the natural environment. CPF member Barbara Sheehan is leading an advocacy effort to support passage of PA House Bill 652, which requires greater transparency about the impact on human and natural habitats resulting from new facility construction, or facility expansion, in areas throughout Pennsylvania designated as environmental justice areas.

The fourth theme, fellowshipping with each other, invites new and existing CPF members to break bread together over discussions of past and future peacemaking. This idea of fellowship stems from a genuine sense of gratitude felt towards those who have historically led, and those who are currently leading, our peacemaking efforts. This idea of fellowship is a recognition that our diminutive peaceful practices and daily peaceful social interactions can transform into a vibrant community emulating non-violence when we support and celebrate with each other. We invite all to join us on the 2nd Sunday of each month, immediately following the 10am mass at St. Malachy's Church.

CPF's synodality and discernment process, invited us to listen to the legacy of our past peacemakers, asked us to listen to the passions of our current peacemakers, and inspired us to listen for the Holy Spirit's message of hope in our future peacemaking. U.S. Peace Activist Given Longest Prison Term in German Campaign to Oust U.S. Nuclear Bombs –

First Ever U.S. Woman Sentenced to Prison in Decades-Long Effort

Susan Crane, of the Redwood City, California Catholic Worker, has been sentenced to 229 days in prison in Germany for daring to interfere with the U.S. nuclear weapons stationed at Germany's Büchel Air Force base, southeast of Cologne.

Crane participated in six nonviolent go-in actions, confronting the air force system on base which routinely trains to drop the U.S. H-bombs on targets in Russia,[1] most provocatively this winter in operation "Steadfast Defender 24" — which was launched in the midst of NATO's war in Ukraine.[2]

As a result of convictions on misdemeanor charges of trespass and damage to the chain-link fence, Crane was fined a total of twenty-five-hundred Euros. Now, for refusing to admit guilt or pay, a mid-level court on Jan. 18, 2024 ordered Crane to report June 4, 2024 to Rohrbach penitentiary, a 450-bed, co-ed in southwest Germany. Crane's 7.6- month penalty is the longest prison sentence ever imposed in the 25-year-long series of rallies, protests, marches, peace camps, and civil resistance directed at the NATO nuclear weapons base. Crane is also the first U.S. woman to be ordered to German prison in the decades-long effort.

In 2018, and 2019, Crane and others were able to get inside the base and even climb atop earthen bunkers used to store both the nuclear weapons and German Tornado fighter jets. (See photo.) Dozens of Germans, as well as two other U.S. citizens and one Dutch national have done prison time in Germany for related go-in actions.

Between 2017 and 2021, Susan joined five delegations of U.S. anti-nuclear activists attending annual summer peace camps just outside the base — organized by Nukewatch and the local group Nonviolent Action to Abolish Nuclear Weapons. Crane said in a statement March 6, "When we went on the base, we reminded the military that nuclear weapons are illegal and immoral. We asked them to resign their commissions, or, if ordered, to refuse to load the nuclear weapons on their Tornado fighter jets, or to drop them anywhere."

"I thought the German courts would listen to the reasons we went onto the base, and understand that our peaceful actions were justified as acts of crime prevention. But international law was not respected," Crane said.

According to legal scholars, the U.S. transfer of its nuclear weapons to Germany — formally a non-nuclear weapons state — is prohibited by the Treaty on Nonproliferation. Articles I and II of the treaty explicitly forbid any "transfer to any recipient whatsoever nuclear weapons". The U.S. nuclear bombs at Büchel are the 170-kiloton "B61-3," and the 50-kiloton "B61-4."[3]

Crane, who has two adult children and four grandchildren, has devoted her life in California to serving poor and often homeless people of Redwood City. In her statement, she said, "I see people living in camps, living in cars, and I see working people who don't have enough income for basic needs like rent, food, or medical care. Then, I think of the money wasted on war-making by the U.S. and NATO nations; and that 3% of the U.S. military budget alone could end starvation around the world."

Crane argued at trial that she was justified in attempting to interfere with an "ongoing criminal conspiracy", the unlawful plan to wage wars of mass destruction, wars in violation of the Geneva Conventions and the Nuremberg Charter and Judgment. Crane appealed the convictions all the way to Germany's highest court. However, it was dismissed without comment in the same way it has ignored 19 similar anti-nuclear protest case appeals. Susan then appealed to the European Court of Human Rights, in Strasbourg, France, just as five others in the campaign have done. (The ECHR hears appeals by defendants from 31 EU states who've exhausted legal redress in their respective countries.) Last December, the ECHR used a technicality to reject Crane's appeal and did not address its merits. The ECHR has yet to decide whether to take up the appeals from the other weapons resisters.

"I don't want to give money to the court system which I view as protecting nuclear weapons," Crane said in her statement. "I don't believe nonviolently resisting nuclear madness is wrong, and I don't need to apologize for it. Paying a fine would be like admitting some guilt, while refusing is a way of withdrawing my cooperation from the courts, and from the judges who build a wall of silence and hide behind it. They deny that threatening mass destruction violates international law. I acted to uphold this law, but they pretend that treaties don't apply in their courtrooms," Crane said.

To People of Faith, Good Will, and Moral Conscience,

Fifty-seven years ago, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. stood at the pulpit of Riverside Church and gave his famous speech 'A Time to Break Silence.' With the same vision for peace which Dr. King held out for Vietnam and the world after Vietnam, we raise our voices to demand that the United States end its support for Israel's massacre of Palestinian civilians in Gaza and the West Bank, the destruction of its infrastructure, and the removal of its population from their ancestral home.

The statements of the Biden administration and its United Nations voting record make clear that the United States stands alone in providing massive military and diplomatic support for the reign of death and terror unfolding in Palestine and lacks the qualifications to be an honest broker of a just peace.

As a nation we possess immense influence with which we can leverage negotiations in Israel in the pursuit of a just peace. Dr. King spoke of the "fierce urgency of NOW." This historic crisis presents us with the opportunity - and the obligation - to act with courage NOW.

Renowned activist and academic Angela Davis has identified the current crisis in Gaza and Palestine as "a moral litmus test for the West." We call upon our political leaders and those who look to us for moral guidance, to act now to end the suffering of innocents and the wholesale destruction of Palestinian society. At similar times in our nation's history, religious leaders have issued this very same call to our nation's conscience: addressing the civil rights struggle in our country, opposing the Vietnam War, and condemning apartheid in South Africa. At those times we passed the test -- and world leaders responded. We dare not fail the test today.

In the name of All That is Holy, we demand an immediate cessation of the support that our nation provides - in the form of political, diplomatic, financial, and military support - for the violence and killing of Palestinians in Gaza and the West Bank. We demand a complete and permanent ceasefire, the facilitation of massive humanitarian aid, the resumption of UNRWA financial support, and a commitment to the restoration of Gaza's infrastructure.

And we demand from our religious and spiritual leaders concrete actions that cry out to heaven – and to our government -- for a just and lasting peace in Palestine.

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

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Door to the Path Taken by Robert F. McGovern tribute to **Blessed Franz Jagerstatter**

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
